bargain (n) / ba:.gin/

(something on sale at a lower price) This coat was half-price - a real bargain.

definitely (adv) / def.ɪ.nət.li/

(without any doubt) Have you definitely decided to go to Costa Rica?

entrance (n) /'en.trans/

(a door, gate, etc. by which you can enter a building or place) There are two entrances - one at the front and one around the back

exit (n) / ek.sit/

(the door through which you might leave a building or large vehicle) We headed for the nearest exit.

expert (n) / ek.spa:t/

(a person with a high level of knowledge or skill relating to a particular subject or activity) My mother is an expert at dress-making.

fair (n) /feər/

(a large public event where goods are bought and sold, usually from tables that have been specially arranged for the event) I bought a wooden salad bowl at the local craft fair.

**fee** (n) /fi:/

(an amount of money paid for a particular piece of work or for a particular right or service) We couldn't pay the lawyer's fee.

in a while (idiom)

(sometimes, but not regularly) You meet some really interesting people every once in a while.

latest (adj) / lei.tist/

(newest or most recent or modern) Have you seen her latest movie?

question (n) / kwes.t[ən/

(a sentence or phrase used to find out information) "So where is the missing money?" "That's a good question."

real (adj) /rɪəl/

(existing in fact and not imaginary) He doesn't think climate change is real.

technology (n) /tek nal ə dzi/

(the methods for using scientific discoveries for practical purposes, esp. in industry) With computer technology, even people working on their own can produce professional-looking documents.

wireless (adj) / waɪər·ləs/

(not needing wires to make a connection or to communicate) They have a plan to link 9,700 office buildings to the Net via a high-speed wireless network.

Computer words

cursor (n) / ks:.sər/

(a line on a computer screen that moves to show the point where work is being done) You can move the cursor either by using the mouse or by using the arrow keys on the keyboard.

**keyboard** (n) /ˈkiː.bɔːd/

(the set of keys on a computer or typewriter that you press in order to make it work) *The computer comes with a wireless mouse and keyboard.* 

laptop (n) / læp.top/

(a computer that is small enough to be carried around easily and is flat when closed) *I always take my laptop when I travel.* 

monitor (n) / mpn.i.tər/

(a computer screen or a device with a screen on which words or pictures can be shown) *Doctors watched* the old man's heartbeat on a monitor.

mouse (n) /maʊs/

(a small device that you move across a surface in order to move a cursor on your computer screen) A mouse is a device which makes it easier to select different options from computer menus.

mouse pad (n) / maos pæd/

(the special flat piece of material on which you move the mouse of a computer) *Small rolling lectern desks* or computer carts with tiny desktops provide just enough room for a laptop computer and a mouse pad.

printer (n) /'prɪn.tər/

(a machine that is connected to a computer and prints onto paper using ink) *The book is now at the printers*.

screen (n) /skri:n/

(a flat surface in a cinema, on a television, or as part of a computer, on which pictures or words are shown) *Our television has a 19-inch screen.* 

speakers (n) /'spi:.kər/

(the part of a radio, television, or computer, or of a piece of electrical equipment for playing recorded sound, through which the sound is played) *There's no sound coming out of the right-hand speaker*.

USB flash drive (n) /juː.esˈbiː flæʃ draɪv/

(a small piece of equipment that you connect to a computer or other piece of electronic equipment to copy and store information) Simon copies the contents of the computer to a flash drive.

advice (n) /ədˈvaɪs/

(an opinion that someone offers you about what you should do or how you should act in a particular situation) Steven gave me some good advice.

certainly (adv) /'ss:.tən.li/

(used to reply completely or to emphasize something and show that there is no doubt about it) *Do you think more money should be given to education?* 

Certainly!

check out (ph verb) /t[ek/

(to examine something or get more information about it in order to be certain that it is true, safe, or suitable) We'll need to check out his story.

connect (v) /kəˈnekt/

(to join or be joined with something else) Can I connect my printer to your computer?

future (n) / fju:.tjər/

(a period of time that is to come) Sometimes I worry about the future.

last (v) /la:st/

(to continue) They say the snow will last until the end of next week.

promise (v) /'prom.is/

(to tell someone that you will certainly do something) He promised faithfully to call me every week.

sound (n) /saond/

(something that you can hear or that can be heard) She stood completely still, not making a sound.

turn on (ph verb)/ts:n/

(to start to show a particular quality) *If you are not able to turn on the camera, restart the computer.* 

<u>Gadgets</u>

e-reader (n) /'iː.riː.dər/

(a small electronic device with a screen that allows you to read books in an electronic form) *This book is also available in e-reader format.* 

game console (n) / geɪm ˌkɒn.səʊl/

(a piece of electronic equipment for playing games on) *Most of the kids had a Playstation, Xbox, or other game console.* 

headphones (n) /ˈhed.fəʊnz/

(a device with a part to cover each ear through which you can listen to music, radio broadcasts, etc. without other people hearing) *After completing this task, they put on the headphones.* 

smartphone (n) /ˈsmaːt.fəʊn/

(a mobile phone that can be used as a small computer and that connects to the internet) *They are promoting a new football game for their latest multi-featured smartphone.* 

smartwatch (n) /'sma:t.wptʃ/

(a watch that has many of the features of a smartphone or a computer) Buy the latest smartwatches from the leading brands in our new wearable technology range.

bottle (n) /'bot.əl/

(a container for liquids, usually made of glass or plastic, with a narrow neck) *Plastic bottles are lighter than glass ones*.

can (n) /kæn/

(a closed metal container, especially cylinder-shaped, in which some types of drink and food are sold) *You'll need a can of tuna for this recipe.* 

clean (adj) /kli:n/

(free from any dirty marks, pollution, bacteria, etc) Make sure your hands are clean before you have your dinner.

cut down (ph verb) /knt daon/

(to reduce the number, amount, or size of something) They are cutting down forests to clear land for cattle.

cycle (v) /'saɪ.kəl/

(to ride a bicycle) Most of the kids cycle or walk to school.

dirty (adj.) / da:.ti/

(marked with dirt, mud, etc. or containing something such as pollution or bacteria) *Her face was dirty and tear-stained.* 

do the washing-up (ph verb) /duː ðiːˌwɒʃ.ɪŋˈʌp/

(the act of cleaning plates, pans, glasses, knives, forks, etc. after a meal, or the objects needing to be washed) You do the washing-up and I'll do the drying.

during (prep) /ˈdʒʊə.rɪŋ/

(from the beginning to the end of a particular period) They work during the night and sleep by day.

energy (n) / en.ə.dʒi/

(the power from something such as electricity or oil that can do work, such as providing light and heat) *The energy generated by the windmill drives all the drainage pumps.* 

environment (n) /ɪnˈvaɪ.rən.mənt/

(the air, water, and land in or on which people, animals, and plants live) *Certain chemicals have been banned because of their damaging effect on the environment.* 

leaflet (n) /ˈliː.flət/

(a piece of paper that gives you information or advertises something) *Demonstrators handed out leaflets to passers-by.* 

miss out (ph verb) /mis aut/

(to fail to include someone or something that should be included) You've missed out your address on the form.

plant (v) /pla:nt/

(to put a plant into the ground or into a container of soil so that it will grow) We planted trees and bushes in our new garden.

protect (v) /prəˈtekt/

(to keep someone or something safe from injury, damage, or loss) It's important to protect your skin from the harmful effects of the sun.

public transport (n) / pxb.lik 'træn.sport/

(a system of vehicles such as buses and trains that operate at regular times on fixed routes and are used by the public) *Greater investment in public transport would keep more cars off the roads.* 

```
recycle (v) / riːˈsaɪ.kəl/
```

(sort and collect rubbish in order to treat it and produce useful materials that can be used again) *The Japanese recycle more than half their waste paper.* 

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recycling bin (n) / riːˈsaɪ.klɪŋ bɪn/
```

(a container for collecting and changing old paper, glass, plastic, etc. so that it can be used again) *Unfinished food must be scraped into the garbage or food recycling bin.* 

```
reuse (v) / riːˈjuːz/
```

(to use something again) To conserve resources, please reuse this carrier bag.

```
soap (n) /sอซp/
```

(a substance used for washing the body or other things) *There was no soap, so I just rinsed my hands with water.* 

```
special (adj) /'speʃ.əl/
```

(not ordinary or usual) Is there anything special that you'd like to do today?

take out the rubbish (ph verb) /teɪk ðiː rʌb.ɪʃ aʊt/

(to remove the rubbish from somewhere) I forgot to take the rubbish out this morning.

```
tap (v) /tæp/
```

(to hit something gently, and often repeatedly, especially making short, sharp noises) *The branches tapped against the window.* 

throw (v) /θrəʊ/

(to send something through the air with force, especially by a sudden movement of the arm) My friend threw the ball back over the fence.

```
turn off (ph verb) / ta:n pf/
```

(stop the operation or flow of something by means of a tap, switch, or button) *Turn the TV off when you get to the church*.

## Recyclable materials

```
battery (n) / bæt.ər.i/
```

(a device that produces electricity to provide power for radios, cars, etc.) I left my car lights on all night and now the battery is flat.

```
glass (n) /gla:s/
```

(a hard, transparent material, used to make windows, bottles, and other objects) It's a huge window made from a single pane of glass.

```
metal (n) / met.əl/
```

(a chemical element, such as iron or gold, or a mixture of such elements, such as steel, that is generally hard and strong, and through which electricity and heat can travel) *Metal, paper, and glass can be recycled.* 

```
paper (n)/'pei.per/
```

(thin, flat material made from crushed wood or cloth, used for writing, printing, or drawing on) *I didn't* realize we had to write each answer on a new sheet of paper.

plastic (n) / plæs.tɪk/

(an artificial substance that can be shaped when soft into many different forms and has many different uses) *Those flowers aren't real - they're made of plastic.*

adult (n) / æd. nlt/

(a person or animal that has grown to full size and strength) An adult under English law is someone over 18 years old.

air (n) /eər/

(the mixture of gases that surrounds the earth and that we breathe) I went outside to get some fresh air.

**breathe** (v) /briːð/

(to move air into and out of the lungs) It's so airless in here - I can hardly breathe.

continue (v) /kənˈtɪn.juː/

(to keep happening, existing, or doing something, or to cause something or someone to do this) *It's said* that as the boat went down the band continued to play.

creature (n) / kri:.tjər/

(any large or small living thing that can move independently) Rainforests are filled with amazing creatures.

endangered species (n) /In'deIn·dʒərd 'spi·ʃiz/

(a type of animal or plant that might stop existing because there are only a few of that type alive) *Forests* provide the fresh air we breathe and habitats for endangered species.

extinct (adj) /ikˈstɪŋkt/

(not now existing) There is concern that the giant panda will soon become extinct.

feed (v) /fi:d/

(to give food to a person, group, or animal) I usually feed the neighbour's cat while she's away.

grow (v) /grəʊ/

(to increase in size or amount, or to become more advanced or developed) Children grow so quickly.

harm (v) /ha:m/

(to hurt someone or damage something) Thankfully no one was harmed in the accident.

danger (n) / deɪn.dʒər/

(the possibility of harm or death to someone) He drove so fast that I really felt my life was in danger.

net (n) /net/

(material made of threads of rope, string, wire, or plastic that is used to limit the movement of something) The goalkeeper made a valiant dive for the ball, but couldn't stop it going in the net.

organisation (n) / ɔː.gən.aɪˈzeɪ.ʃən/

(a group of people who work together in an organized way for a shared purpose) the World Health Organization.

pollute (v) /pəˈluːt/

(to make an area or substance, usually air, water, or soil, dirty or harmful to people, animals, and plants, especially by adding harmful chemicals) *The pesticides used on many farms are polluting the water supply.* 

rare (adj) /reər/

(not common or frequent; very unusual) *The museum is full of rare and precious treasures.* 

round (adj) /raond/

(in a circular direction or position; around) The moon goes round the earth.

touch (v) /tntʃ/

(to put your hand or another part of your body lightly onto and off something or someone) *That paint is wet - don't touch (it).* 

weigh (v) /weɪ/

(to have a heaviness of a stated amount, or to measure the heaviness of an object) Yesterday a satellite weighing 15 tons was successfully placed in orbit.

<u>Habitats</u>

coast (n) /kəʊst/

(the land next to or close to the sea) Rimini is a thriving resort on the east coast of Italy.

jungle (n) / dʒʌŋ.gəl/

(a tropical forest in which trees and plants grow very closely together) *The Yanomami people live in the South American jungle.* 

ocean (n) /ˈəʊ.ʃən/

(a very large area of sea) These mysterious creatures live at the bottom of the ocean.

**polar region** (n) /'pəʊ.lər 'riː.dʒən/

(relating to the North or South Pole or the areas around them) *The terrible beauty of the polar regions has fascinated many.* 

**Animals** 

bat (n) /bæt/

(a small animal like a mouse with wings that flies at night) There is a bat in our house. Help us!

deer (n) /dɪər/

(a large animal, the males of which have wide horns that stick out like branches, that lives in forests and eats grass and leaves) *There are deer and cattle, eagles and world famous gardens*.

dolphin (n) / dol.fin/

(a sea mammal that is large, smooth, and grey, with a long, pointed mouth) Looks like a dolphin jumping out of water.

killer whale (n) / kɪl.ə weɪl/

(a large, black and white sea mammal related to dolphins) I saw something like a killer whale in the sea.

polar bear (n) / pəʊ.lə 'beər/

(a bear with white fur that lives in the Arctic) Both fox and polar bear species were found on the island.

tiger (n) / tar.gər/

(a large wild animal of the cat family with yellowish-orange fur with black lines that lives in parts of Asia) The zoo has a large collection of tigers.

beach clean-up (phrase) /biːtʃ kliːn ʌp/

(to make a beach look clean and tidy) We'll go as soon as I've cleaned up the beach.

clean up (ph verb) /kliːn ʌp/

(to make a person or place clean and tidy) Clean yourself up a bit before dinner.

collect rubbish /kəˈlekt ˈrʌb.ɪʃ/

(To take out rubbish from the beach) Every time I go to the beach I take a bag to collect rubbish.

hopefully (adv) / həʊp.fəl.i/

(used, often at the start of a sentence, to express what you would like to happen) Hopefully it won't rain.

ill (adj) /ɪl/

(not feeling well, or suffering from a disease) I felt ill so I went home.

invite (v) /ɪn'vaɪt/

(to ask or request someone to go to an event) We're invited to Lola's party.

reply (n) /rɪˈplaɪ/

(an answer) There were very few replies to our advertisement.

plant (v) /pla:nt/

(to put a plant into the ground or into a container of soil so that it will grow) We planted trees and bushes in our new garden.

stay (v) /steɪ/

(to not move away from or leave a place or situation) Stay until the rain has stopped.

take part in (ph verb) /teɪk paːt/

(join in an activity; be involved) We have come here to take part in a major game.
