




Visitors to Norway might be surprised that Norwegians never seem to smile, but this isn't because they're unhappy. Usually, Norwegians only smile at people they know well — and when they have a reason to do so — but never just to say 'hello', especially to a stranger. In Norway, people don't smile at passers-by in the street or like talking to strangers. So, if a Norwegian person looks at you and smiles, then you know they really mean it.



In South American countries such as Brazil,
Venezuela, Chile and Ecuador, when someone
invites a person over for dinner at their home, it is
polite for guests to arrive from fifteen minutes to
even an hour late. The same is true in India. In India,
one should also never thank a friend or family
member for preparing dinner for them. Instead, if
guests wish to thank their hosts, they can do it by
inviting them to their own home for dinner.

In China, people usually shake hands or nod to greet someone. They also greet the oldest person first to show their respect. It is polite to offer a gift to a Chinese person when you visit them. You might be used to using one hand when giving something to somebody, but remember: always use both hands when you give Chinese

use both hands when you give Chinese people a present. However, don't be surprised if people don't take your present the first time. It is common for the Chinese to say 'no' even up to three times before finally accepting a present. If you receive a present, you should never open it immediately; just say thank you and wait until you are alone.
