	Fuchta	How to Make Language Memorable
		The more we can help our students link new information with what they have already learnt and encode it in deep and meaningful ways, the better the new language will make a successful transition from short-term to long-term memory. Hence, the primary focus of our teaching has to be on making connections and achieving understanding.
		Another key insight is that all memory is reconstructive. As teachers we need to be aware that helping our learners remember requires leading them through various processes that facilitate reconstruction. In this webinar, we'll briefly discuss key aspects from the science of learning and and look at a number of practical ways of developing our learners' ability to retrieve vocabulary, chunks of language and grammatical structures successfully so learning will be more fun to our students and help them develop a healthy self-concept.
